

Baroque/Jazz cycle 4

Dm7 G7 Cmaj7 Fmaj7 Bm7(b5) E7 Am(maj7) Am

Two part texture
i.e. Guidetones

Dm7 G7 Cmaj7 Fmaj7 Bm7(b5) E7 Am

Classic 'diminution' using scale steps
Notice the melodic sequence, moving down a step every two bars

Dm7 G7 Cmaj7 Fmaj7 Bm7b5 E7 Am

Jazz version - the only difference is in the rhythm

Dm7 G7 Cmaj7 Fmaj7

Bm7b5 E7 Am

Two part invention example (extending Bach's pattern, guidetones in blue, 9ths in red)

The ninths are a product of octave displacement or 'pivoting' of the scale
a common technique on Bach and bebop

Am Dm9 G Cmaj9

F Bm7b9b5 E Am

A melodic minor used ascending & descending

Just the line on its own ala a jazz solo

We still hear the progression even without the bass
